Abundantly More

The account of the wedding at Cana is well known, so we know how it turned out. Mary though didn't have the benefit of our hindsight and Jesus hadn't yet done anything miraculous. However, her simple statement, "They have no more wine," showed her belief that Jesus could resolve



the situation. Her faith in Him was so sure that she boldly told the servants to do whatever Jesus told them to do. Mary trusted Jesus even though she didn't know what He might do or what she was asking for. She simply trusted Him.

We can only speculate about what Mary was hoping for. It's hard to imagine that Mary, who had never seen Jesus perform a miracle, would have anticipated Jesus instantly changing six huge jars of water into the best wine. Nevertheless, she didn't only trust Jesus with the problem, she *also* didn't try to sort out what she thought was needed. She left what was needed up to Jesus.

We can easily turn to Jesus for the solutions we want or think we need. We'd do well to learn from Mary. Let us take our problems to Jesus and trust Him for <u>His</u> solution. What we think we need is often much less than God intends for us. After all, no one would have imagined that Jesus would miraculously deliver an abundance of the best wine!

God, who "is able to accomplish abundantly more than all we can ask or imagine" (Ephesians 3.20), can do so much more for us than we can do for ourselves when we follow Mary's example in trusting Jesus. *Martin*


